February 15 -- Some states recognize **Susan B. Anthony's** birthday, February 15. She was known for promoting women's rights and starting the women's suffrage movement in the United States. In 1920, the "Anthony Amendment" to the U.S. Constitution (19<sup>th</sup> amendment) gave women the right to vote. She was the first American woman to have her likeness on a U.S. coin

February 18, the third Monday in February, is **President's Day**, to honor U. S. Presidents. Originally established to celebrate George Washington's Birthday (February 22) it was made a federal holiday in 1885. In 1971 the holiday was moved to the third Monday in February. Raise your flag to honor those who have led our country!

### **A PIECE OF GFWC HISTORY**



GFWC can lay claim to many prominent clubwomen such as **Margaret Chase Smith**, a longtime Republican politician from Skowhegan, Maine -- first woman to earn election to both the House of Representatives (1940 – 1949) and the Senate (1949 – 1973). An independent and courageous legislator, a member of the Armed Services Committee, Smith passed her landmark legislative achievement in the House: the Women's Armed Forces Integration Act. With a wartime peak enrollment of about 350,000, women were still considered volunteers for the armed services and did not receive any benefits. She was a strong advocate for equal treatment of women in the military. In the 1940s she co-sponsored the Equal Rights Amendment. In 1943, Smith was appointed to the House Naval Affairs Committee and made a 25,000-mile tour of bases in the South Pacific. She became the first and only civilian woman to sail on a U.S. Navy ship during WWII. An amazing woman, a member of GFWC who volunteered, served, and contributed so much during her lifetime. She died in 1995.
