Please spread the word about the Laramie Woman's Club 2024-2025 Mary Godat Bellamy Scholarship! The scholarship is available to both women and men and will benefit a **non-traditional** Albany County, Wyoming, resident age 18 or older that is currently attending or will be attending a Wyoming university, college, or licensed and accredited technical, vocational, or trade school during the 2024-2025 academic year.

A non-traditional applicant must meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Did not attend an institution of higher learning immediately upon completion of high school, but may currently be enrolled, OR
- Did not attend an institution of higher learning immediately after obtaining a GED, but may currently be enrolled, OR
- Withdrew from an institution of higher learning before receiving a diploma or certification from the institution for any reason.

The amount of the 2024-2025 scholarship will be \$1,000; the application form can be found at: www.gfwcwyoming.org/scholarships.html

Deadline for submission of applications will be Saturday, April 13, 2024.

ONO BANANA-NUT BREAD

"Rise and Dine America"—Marcy Claman Several members requested Sharon Hand's recipe for the delicious banana bread she brought to the February meeting.

ONO = Good in Hawaiian

3 Tblsp buttermilk ½ cup sugar ½ cup brown sugar 1 tsp baking soda ½ cup butter 3-4 bananas-mashed 2 eggs 1 cup chopped macadamia 2 cups flour nuts, pecans or walnuts

½ tsp baking powder 1 tsp vanilla

½ tsp salt (optional) Chocolate chips (optional) Preheat oven to 350°. Grease 9" x 5" x 3" loaf pan (bundt pan or 24 muffin cups). Cream sugar and butter. Blend in eggs. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to the batter. Combine buttermilk and baking soda and stir into the batter. Add mashed bananas, nuts and vanilla. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 45 minutes if using loaf or bundt pan or 30 minutes if using muffin pans. Yield: 1 loaf
