DID YOU KNOW? To celebrate our club this month I will highlight the Western Meadowlark. The buoyant, flutelike melody of the Western Meadowlark ringing out across a field can brighten anyone's day. Meadowlarks are often more easily heard than seen unless you spot a male singing from a fence post. This colorful member of the blackbird family flashes a vibrant yellow breast crossed by a distinctive, black, V-shaped band. Look and listen for these stout ground feeders in grasslands, meadows, pastures, and along marsh edges throughout the West and Midwest where flocks strut and feed on seeds and insects.

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The female Western Meadowlark chooses a nest spot on the ground in pasture, prairie, or other grassland habitat. She seeks out a small dip or depression such as a cow footprint, often shielded by dense vegetation that can make the nest difficult to see.

Nest Description - Working alone, the female Western Meadowlark uses her bill to shape a depression in the soil into a cup-like shape, then lines the nest with soft, dry grasses and the pliable stems of shrubs. Although some nests are simple grasslined bowls, Western Meadowlarks often use the vegetation around the nest cup as an anchor to create a hoodlike, waterproof dome over the nest by weaving together grass and shrub stems. When finished the nest is 7–8 inches across, with a cup that is 4–5 inches across and 2–3 inches deep. It can take 6–8 days for the female to build the season's first nest. As the parents move back and forth from the nest they create short "runways" into surrounding grasslands. Coalition for the Homeless – Continued support. Will need some painting in the future of a couple of sheds on the property. Always in need of paper products such as paper towels and toilet paper. We will hold a winter hat and glove drive at the Market.

Meals of Hope – Another project addressing Food Insecurity. Packing meals for those in need. Larks are going to participate in the next project. Date, time, and cost for our club to be determined.

Veterans Rock (VR) - Continued Support – currently accepting new and used small apartment sized appliances such as 5 cup coffee pots, 1.5-2 qt slow cookers, toasters and hand mixers.

This is an ongoing project. On May 4 VFW 11453 to which Trish and Mary Lee are members is having a bike drive in the parking lot of Town and Country. Donated bikes will go to VR.

Project Lifesaver – Wrist Bracelets with GPS to locate missing persons who may wander off. Bracelets are worn by many elderly, dementia, and handicapped patients. Julie explained that this project is fully funded by Cheyenne Police and Laramie County Sheriff's departments. What is needed is about once a month persons to go to the homes to change the batteries. Volunteers will have to pass a background check, (provided by Police Dept at no charge), and the Larks will work in teams to go into the homes.

Meadowlarks Market – Our own fundraising project. New chair is Trish Peoples with cochairs Mary Lee Dixon and Flo Beville. Date is October 26 and a sign up sheet will be provided for participation. Karen is also staying on for one more year, Patty offered to help as much as she can to learn the process.

Irlen's Syndrome – Screening children and adults for reading disabilities due to Irlen's Syndrome. Volunteers may take the two day training and participate in screenings. Next training is set for July 12 and 13. Contact Nancy Kaufman for more information.
